VIII. COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA

Paul Driscoll, 141 Harris Road; Kip Cherry, 24 Dempsey Avenue and Kate Warren, 17 Jefferson Road all addressed Council concerning the use of light frame wood construction and 24 hour fire watch. (Comments attached to this set of minutes)

Mayor Lempert said that staff had met about this issue and discussion of an ordinance had taken place and she said that the professional staff felt the current ordinance gives them the flexibility and the authority they need to keep the construction site safe and that if we did codified an ordinance it could potential tie their hands. Mr. Dashield agreed with Mayor Lempert saying that between the Fire Official and Construction Official, they currently have flexibility in what they can do and that this flexibility gives them better control on the work site and they prefer that flexibility moving forward.

Junior Romero, New Jersey Food and Water Watch, asked Council members to support the U.S. Conference of Mayors in achieving transition to 100% clean, renewable energy by 2035 by signing the OFF Fossil Fuels Elected Official Pledge. He also thanked Council for passing a resolution opposing the Transco pipeline and added that Food and Water Watch is sponsoring a "Stop the Transco Gas Compressor Station information meeting on September 14, 2017 beginning at 6:30pm and South Brunswick High School. Mayor Lempert asked Mr. Quinn raise this issue to the Princeton Environmental Commission for their guidance.

IX. REPORTS

1. June 2017 Police Report

Chief Sutter stated that the eclipse viewing event was outstanding with a huge turnout, it had a community feel and everyone was really energetic and friendly which was a great environment that was enjoyed by the officers and said it was one officers first day on the road and it was a great opportunity to introduce her to the community. Chief Sutter stated with regards to the police report he had a few comments he wanted to bring to Councils attention concerning speeding enforcement. He said that in regards to the relationship of last year's report we are really up on enforcement and we are really targeting the problem. It is a multifaceted approach to this not just enforcement but doing a lot of data gathering, analyzing and trying to specifically go to the real problem areas. unfortunately it is a never ending cycle, we rectified problems through enforcement, but it seems to over time come back, so we try to look for other ways of doing enforcement through the speed signs and various message board which is educational to combat this. Chief Sutter stated that he added a twist to this report and at the end there are six new reports added, as suggested by Council President Crumiller at the last Council meeting, saying that it would be useful to look at the demographic information on things like marijuana arrest and use of force for example. The Risk Assessment Committee has been analyzing these things for several years now, so every quarter it is the Peer Assessment Group that gets together and looks at high risk and high liability things and biased base policing. He said things that we are looking for are trends in the aggregate and individual officers and that Lieutenant Morgan actually developed an algorithm that can look for trends across these different areas with regards to demographics. Every quarter with the internal tools that are being used and captured, we can include the demographic that is captured in the police report and the public can go on line and review it.

Council President Crumiller said that the information is great and also feels that it would be helpful for the public to see the total numbers. Chief Sutter stated that on reviewing the report he agrees that the total number should be added which they have.

Councilwoman Howard also replied that the information is great and said you've created this internally, this base line, this early warning system that allows the public to appreciate and understand. Ms. Howard stated that it is good to see the new officers tonight and wanted a reminder on where they are in the process of being out in the public, how many are starting on patrol and how many will be attending the academy. Chief Sutter replied that Ashley Gaylord is certified and her first field training was today, the first day on the road and said it is a five month process to be on her own without a training officer. Ryan McDermott and Adam Santos will being attending full academy starting on October 10, 2017, with a little less than a year to be out in the public, and Michael Miceli and James Eufemia, because of their prior employment received a partial waiver from the New Jersey State Police Training Commission, which means that they have to go to certain specific training at the academy which will be a little less than about 2 months of academy time and will then be ready for field training. He said they are also using

them while waiting for the academy in different areas where we need help in the Police department, so they are getting exposed to a lot of different things. Ms. Howard stated if it would helpful if the Chief could update the public and Council about what was discussed a couple months ago on revisiting and revising your police directive relating to immigration and update the process you have undertaken. Chief Sutter replied that in 2013 the police had their initial order and training on immigration issues. In the beginning of 2017 there was a statewide push by a lot of departments, specifically from the ACLU, to put in place the order and our police department already had one so were ahead of the curve, but there were some additional suggestions made. The Police met with the ACLU and the New Jersey Alliance of Immigration Justice and they each had templates for an order which they reviewed and then talked with immigration experts to vet out some of the suggestions. He said the things that were included were language related, but two specific things were added. One addition was reporting, the order now requires that the police publicly report, which he said will be now be added in the police report quarterly. The second item added was U Visa, which is a process we had but never reduced to writing. U Visa which is used for victims and witnesses of serious crimes that are looking to get permanent status that the government will grant because of their cooperation with the criminal justice system in a criminal justice matter. New language with some new detainers were added so now the officers are aware of the language and to be clear about the detainer issue. Our orders delineate between the judicially issued warrants and detainer issues by immigration officers, the warrants are judicially binding and have to be enforced, we under the 4th amendment in the constitution of the State of New Jersey can't arrest someone on a detainer issued by an officer so that was very important, and a very high liability for us, so we cleared up some of the language of the new detainers.

2. Best Practices Inventory

Sandra Webb, Chief Financial Officer reviewed with Council the attached Best Practices Inventory and stated that this is the 8th year we brought this to Council which is a requirement of the State. The things that the State has mentioned is for the municipality to promote financial accountability, sound management and transparency and this is one of the things that the division is pushing a lot of the municipality towards as part of the inventory. This year they actually reduced the number of questions down by 5 to 25, and she said she is thrilled that we are at 100% and will not lose any state aid. Ms. Webb pointed out that one of the questions talked about having come before the governing body are the authorities, which would be the Housing Authority and Stony Brook Regional Sewerage Authority and if you remember they came before Council last October so we are still within the one year time frame. An email was sent to the Mayor that we need to keep this on the radar that we would need them back again before Council, so if this question is in the inventory again next year we would be able to answer affirmative Ms. Webb said the audit was filed timely, we did not have any recommendations this year and it being the 5th year of consolidation she feels financially we are really in good shape and said we have gotten through all the obstacles in combining our software and general ledgers and we will continue to

keep moving on along in that direction. Another question talks about the budget whether we met the statutory dates and the dates were extended. In talking with Mr. Dashield today in 2017 that this was one of the smoothest budgets, we were done early and done in the beginning of April, so with Council's help and with the help of Citizens Finance Advisory Committee we are moving some of these processes along. Based on the recommendation of Administration and the action that Council took we eliminated sick leave and eliminated longevity so these are some of the things that the best practice inventory hits on so at 100% there is not much more we can do better.

Council Reports

Councilwoman Howard had no report.

Councilman Liverman reported that on August 19, 2017 there was a ceremony that honored Officer Billie Ellis whom lost his life in the line of duty by the Police Department and the family of Billie Ellis was present.

Councilman Miller reported that Princeton will receive a \$30,000 grant from the New Jersey Forestry Service. The grant is for reforestation and can be used to replace trees lost to the Emerald Ash Borer infestation. The grant application was prepared by our Arborist, Lorraine Konopka, with the help of Janice Most and Bob Hough. The Shade Tree Commission provided the background information on the Emerald Ash Borer infestation and has worked with the municipal Arborist to develop the plans for treatment or removal of infected Ash trees. Work under the grant can begin this Fall. The \$30,000 will be payable to the municipality after the trees have been planted and sustained for a couple of years by the municipality.

Council President Crumiller had no report.

Councilwoman Butler reported that the Community Park Pool had about 97,000 visitors so far this year and said we definitely will be over 100,000, but she doubts that they will break a record unless there will be perfect weather from now until the end of the year. She again mentioned that the pool will be open September 9th and September 10th, 2017. The Aquathon was held over the weekend which was great and had a beautiful day attended by a good number of kids and families. The camp program concluded included 23 weeks of total camp with over 600 kids participating so it was very successful. Ms. Butler also mentioned that the Recreation Department did a new lifeguard certification and were able to train 18 new lifeguards, some of which are hired for next year. Ms. Butler also reported that since May 1, 2017, full time staffers, the non overtime eligible employees, through the Recreation Department have worked 508 extra hours which is equivalent to 73 days.

Councilman Quinn had no report.

Mayor Lempert reported the new website contract is on the agenda for tonight and everyone that is on the working group including Council President Crumiller and Councilman Quinn are really excited about the group that is coming in. The group will be meeting with different department heads and getting the pages up and running. They have a pretty ambitious time line but if we stick pretty close to it we will be really pleased with the new website in not too many months. Mayor Lempert also reported that the Bloomberg Philanthropies have a contest every year and they move it around the world and in 2017 US cities can now compete. For the first time Princeton qualifies in part according to the census, Princeton has just over 30,000 residents and Bloomberg has lowered their qualifying numbers. It is an exciting contest, and what they ask each city/town to do is to think about a big urgent problem that they are facing and come up with a solution that is innovative, that can be done not just in their town but can be replicated in other towns. If Princeton becomes one of the finalist, there are 35 finalist and each are given \$100,000 to pilot their idea and of those 35 finalist there would be one grand prize winner that wins five million dollars and the four runner ups would win one million dollars each. That is quite a significant amount of money and even the process itself can be an exciting thing for the community but there is a tight time line as an idea needs to be submitting by October 20, 2017. Mayor Lempert stated she sent an email to inform them that Princeton would be interested in participating. At this time we have not heard if we would be chosen, they do have a program were they would send a facilitator to do an idea workshop with us on September 20, 2017. In the meantime everyone from Council and the public should start thinking of ideas and said she encourages everyone to go to the Bloomberg Philanthropies website and look up Mayor's Challenge and see past cities that won and past ideas that won to give a sense of the kind of projects they are choosing.

X. ORDINANCE PUBLIC HEARINGS

1. 2017-50 An Ordinance By Princeton Creating a No Stopping or Standing Zone on the South Side of Paul Robeson Place Between Chambers Street and Witherspoon Street, and Amending The "Code Of The Borough Of Princeton, New Jersey, 1974"

2. 2017-46 An Ordinance Revising the Code of Princeton Regarding Residential Clusters and Amending the "Code of the Township of Princeton, New Jersey, 1968"

Lee Solow stated that this ordinance was introduced on June 26, 2017, an amendment to the residential cluster section of Princeton's land use code. The Planning Board reviewed the ordinance on June 29, 2017 and found it consistent

with the master plan. The ordinance has been a subject to a lot of drafts and what was introduced, we think we have a very well balance ordinance. Mr. Solow wanted to remind Council the purpose of clustering is to allow the most developable areas of the site to be more intensely developed in return for preserving open space or preserving the most environmentally sensitive portion of the site. The cluster ordinance has been in place for over thirty years and has been amended from time to time. First, it was amended to encourage preserving more than 50% of the site, then amended to allow access to that open space as well. The existing cluster ordinance provides a density bonus when a developer dedicates walking paths through the open space, when they preserves more than 50% of the site and when they provide an active recreation site, at least a half an acre, they can receive currently under the ordinance up to a 35% bonus if they were to total up all the bonuses and then there is a cap. The amendment before you tonight adds a new category which is a density bonus for dedicated suitable lands for affordable housing. What we are looking for as we deal with our affordable housing obligation and realizing that it is going to be continuing whether it is this next round which goes to 2025 or another round that will go to 2030 and beyond. We need to think ahead and decide how we can meet that need. This ordinance allows us to do that by getting land but does not say what would happen on the land, just to bank it so we can come back to it when we need it and craft zoning that will indicate what is there. We have put in a caveat that the land that is being offered for dedication and the affordable housing must be in a sewer service area or have sewer service; it should have frontage on existing or proposed roads; no more than 20% of the site can be in steep slopes, wetlands or flood hazard areas; and it needs to be free of any environmental hazards. So we are trying to build into something and if we get the land, is it suitable for development and can it be develop in the future and we believe that this provides a minimum of insurance that it can be. Mr. Solow stated that in order for a developer to be eligible for the affordable housing bonus we put in some additional requirements and currently the ordinance only requires either a 6 or 8 acre parcel to do clustering, we thought with affordable housing it needed to be a large site, so we are requiring 75 acres. We are also requiring that 70% of the tract be open space and before it was indicated only at 50%. We bumped up the setback for the cluster development, under the current ordinance it had to be setback 40 feet around its perimeter but if they are taking advantage of the affordable housing cluster it has to go 100 feet around the entire perimeter of the site. The applicant can receive up to a 30% of the density bonus for the affordable housing and we placed a cap of 50% on any of the bonuses.

Councilwoman Butler stated that she has a concern that when we are talking about properties that might fall into this category we are talking about substantial acreage and wonders whether that is in keeping with what we are talking about in where we would want affordable housing if we are looking at smart growth. She said we are always happy to have affordable housing but this might not have been our first choice as this site is pretty far out on Route 206. There is a bus line but not near it, it is more near to the Franklin/Montgomery services. She also stated that in reading the report from the Princeton Environmental Commission it sounds like that they are

skeptical that if all setbacks are met including New Jersey Department Environmental Protection for all water, they may not be able to put in all thirty units. She asked if we are confident that we can put in the thirty units and if not than what would happen. Mr. Solow responded that there is a concept that is in place and believes that the concept works out. He stated that part of the process will be going to the Planning Board and the way our cluster ordinance is structured it will work whether there is an affordable housing component or not. A developer would have to submit what is called an "as of right plan" and show a subdivision that complies with zoning, the right lot area, the setback, shows that it has a reasonable building envelope (a place to put a house) and if they can't do that or that they can't maximize their yield based on that analysis then they will get less units.

Mayor Lempert open the public hearing.

Steven Jardin, Herrontown Lane, stated that he was speaking on behalf of the 18 residents that live on Herrontown Lane and formed a Herrontown Lane Association. Mr. Jardin read a statement that the residents object to the ordinance presented to Council tonight. (Statement appended to this set of minutes)

Valerie Haynes, Mt. Lucas Road, stated that she comes to this at a total different prospective of the cluster ordinance and that a developer can get a bonus for providing some additional property that would be dedicated to affordable housing is perfectly appropriate and makes a lot of sense. We give bonuses in the ordinance now for recreational sites and for the path and trails. We need affordable housing, which we are committed to in our master plan and is one of our primary goal. Ms. Haynes stated that the concern she has is that in the initial letter requesting that the Council consider the ordinance amendment which came from the developer, Lanwin Developer, stated that they have spoken with the township staff and after internally discussing ideals the municipality was not inclined to an inclusionary development proposal but was interested in a more modest bonus, an exchange for a lot. They proposed perhaps it was possible to do a sufficiently higher density and have an inclusionary development that has 15 to 20% set aside for affordable units. Ms. Haynes stated she does not know if that will work on that site and no one else will know if that will work since it has not be discussed or explored in public. When you are zoning a piece of property and amending an ordinance that impacts specific property you should look at it not only from the prospective of the property owner but what the property owner sees as the best use from his prospective and of the town's prospective. Our prospective as a town according to our public statements is that we not only want moderate income housing but we also want middle income housing. In our master plan specifically in the strategy section of the housing element specifically says clusters are a way to achieve more middle income housing, not just to preserve open space, which they do and which is a good thing, but for more middle income housing which we need. It was substantial discussed throughout the town for many months about the concerns people have and I am frustrated that the conversation has not occurred.

Nat Bottigheimer, 26 White Pine Lane, said he echo's the concerns that were raised by Councilwoman Butler about the location of the affordable housing and agrees with Ms. Haynes saying it is appropriate use of land and the appropriate arrangement with the municipality. It is a concern about its location and the mobility and access to economic any other opportunities that would be available to residents of any future development on that site. Every effort would need to be made to make sure it is a good location for affordable housing and also echo the comments of Ms. Haynes made about middle income housing.

Tom Letizia, Esq., Pepper Hamilton, representing the Lanwin Development Corp, stated that Lanwin is the owner of the 90 acre site near the location of Herrontown Road and Mount Lucas Road. Mr. Letizia stated that this is the property that initiated this ordinance amendment some twenty months ago and may be eligible to receive the additional cluster provision. He said he appeared at Council at the time of introduction back in June, appeared before the Planning Board and the Planning Board reviewed this in different capacities as either the Planning Board or as ZARC. This ordinance proposal has been under review for some time. Mr. Letizia said what you are being asked to do this evening is to decide a policy, that is do you want to build upon Princeton's residential cluster provisions that have been in effect for decades to encourage preservation of sensitive environmental features, set aside a sufficient amount of open space, provide public access up to the property in exchange for density bonuses, which has been a policy in this town for a long time. In fact Princeton is one of the early pioneers of cluster zoning and continues the trend by adding another public goal of encouraging a donation of land for municipal affordable housing and encouraging even further clustering, a tighter cluster plan in exchange for modest increase density. Council is not being asked to decide the suitability of specific plan at a particular site under the ordinance, such a review as noted will be conducted by the Planning Board as part of a subdivision or site plan application. This is not to minimize the concerns that have been raised by residents of Herrontown Lane and others during this process. Ms. Letizia wanted to note that those comments and concerns will have a full public airing at the appropriate time before the Planning Board. He stated that tonight is a vote on a policy whether you wish to utilize residential cluster provisions to provide the opportunity for affordable housing and you will provide for a greater amount of open space preservation. Finally, he said from his clients prospective this is a not a do or die situation, if you decide that this is not something that you want to proceed with, that his client is ready to proceed under the "as of right" plan under the ordinance and ready to defend that before the Planning Board. Mr. Letizia feels that this ordinance amendment makes a lot of sense, and provides an increase in density for his client but again it will present a number of community goals and objectives that you been discussing and encouraging throughout your zoning ordinances for a very long time. Hopefully you will concur and pass the amendment.

Mayor Lempert closed the public portion of the public hearing.

Ms. Howard asked where the Environmental Commission (PEC) stood on this ordinance. Mr. Quinn responded that the PEC also had issues with separating out the fact that this is not a site plan and that this ordinance is a policy and they have doubts about the as of right plan as it was presented. They endorse clustering that makes the most environmental sense on this site and this proposal was also endorsed by Friends of Princeton Open Space and the Planning Board voted that the ordinance is consistent with the master plan. Mr. Quinn said he is in favor of this ordinance and that concern about the potential affordable site is valid, but for environmental, land and open space reasons he will be voting in favor of the ordinance

Mr. Miller said he had found this discussion very interesting, we are looking at a policy and the objections we have heard pulling it back to a specific site are not Councils concern. Objection to the site do not belong in a discussion in how we develop a policy for cluster housing. The job before Council is not to deal with a specific site but to determine if this is a good ordinance for cluster development, does it contain the features we want for cluster development, which I believes it does, he said.

Ms. Crumiller said she has reservation about this being the kind of housing this ordinance is encouraging, she said it will be very expensive, everyone will have two cars, and we will regret this, we don't want to encourage this and it is not an ideal site for affordable housing and said she will be voting against this ordinance.

Mr. Liverman said he agrees with Councilman Miller, and we should not be site specific, this is a policy. He said he also agrees this may not be an ideal location to us, but others will love to live there in affordable housing and I don't think we should be site specific.

Mr. Howard says she agrees also and we recognize our obligation and moral commitment is significant and every neighborhood should participate and this is a reflection of that. Overall this type of clustering is environmental conscious and she said she will support this ordinance.

Ms. Butler asked if the municipality has to develop the affordable housing site. Mr. Solow responded that Council will have a variety of options but the developer is not required to build the affordable housing site and with that Council will have the opportunity to think about what they want to do. Ms. Butler also said she is not 100 percent convinced that this is environmental better but, said she will probably support the ordinance.

Good evening,

I speak to the urgent need for Princeton to establish a comprehensive 24-7 Fire-Safety Ordinance of its own which is tailored to meet the individual needs of our town. I understand that Council has determined that all Fire & Safety issues should be handled at the state level and that priority for this topic will be reconsidered in 2018. Actually, as this is a critical health and safety issue which impacts the lives of many Princeton residents, I would like to ask if Council members can rethink their position at this time or at least over the next couple of days.

As most of you know, a number of citizens have been continuously working with many state officials and legislators on New Jersey Fire & Safety codes for the past 2 & 1/2 years. This complex and multi-faceted issue at first may confuse some as to who has jurisdiction over what. Although building code regulations for permitted construction must be determined at the state level, municipalities <u>do</u> have complete jurisdiction to develop a local ordinance for 24-7 Fire-Safety to oversee building sites for residential and commercial buildings during construction.

It is important to have a clear, comprehensive ordinance very soon for many reasons.

- * While it is true that Assembly Speaker Prieto has introduced Bill A-97 outlining 24-7 Fire Safety procedures, it is comparatively watered down at best and may never be passed at all. We need to have a local ordinance which specifically addresses the needs of our community and can be enforced by local officials. As we have seen from past projects, if the state regulations for safety measures are unclear or nonspecific, they are impossible to enforce.
- * We should be prepared. Several sites, situated in high density neighborhoods of Princeton, have been proposed for future developments of multifamily housing. This places many nearby residents at risk if a potentially damaging construction fire breaks out. Earlier this year, there was a massive construction fire in Kansas City which spread to 22 surrounding homes. People were hosing down their roofs to protect their houses. If this were to happen in Princeton, would people be so lucky to even have water available to them? We must have a specific ordinance which is fully enforceable at the time these proposed multifamily structures are scheduled to be built.
- * As Princeton is ahead of most municipalities in the ability to meet affordable housing requirements and is growing faster than some other New Jersey towns, it is all the more important for us to lead the way on establishing a 24-7 Fire-Safety Ordinance.

- *Cities and towns <u>must</u> respond immediately when massive fires break out, <u>not</u> state officials. In Princeton, we have a detailed draft of a proposed Fire-Safety Ordinance (which I have attached), so much of the initial work has been done.
- * The other big component of Fire & Safety is the building construction codes which <u>are</u> state controlled, however, legislators are looking for direction from the League of Municipalities which is where Princeton can lead and exert major influence.
- * Local citizens support the bipartisan Turner/Bateman-Zwicker Bill S1632/A3770, which calls for much tougher fire & safety codes as outlined in the attached 9 point summary. Here is where the League of Municipalities and Princeton can take a more active roll in joining with citizens to see that this bill is passed.

SUMMARY

Requirements for any new multiple dwelling and any attached housing of light frame wood construction. The first two requirements limit highly combustible multifamily to the size of a three-story Type VB building---approximately 18 units per detached structure---and require 30-60 feet of open space between buildings. The bill encourages non-combustible construction for large-scale structures.

- (1) to be a detached structure limited to 7000 square feet per story (Type VB building area limit);
- (2) to be no more than three stories and no more than 40ft high,
- (3) with a fire separation distance of 30 feet between the property line or assumed property line;
- (4) with floors that include habitable space considered a story;
- (5) the number of permitted stories shall be measured from grade plane;
- (6) to have NFPA 13 sprinklers;
- (7) to maintain a 24/7 fire watch by trained fire officials during construction;
- (8) during leasing or sale, notify prospective and current occupants, renters or owners, in writing, of the fire safety limitations of light frame wood construction.
- (9) and, light frame wood construction shall not be permitted in municipalities with a population density of 5,000 persons per square mile.

Proposed Fire-Safety Ordinance

4th Draft

This ordinance pertains to developers/contractors constructing a multiple dwellings of three or more that utilizes light frame construction (Type V) and requires that certain safety measures are followed and that a fire safety permit must be obtained.

- 1. In addition to those safety measures required by the NJ Division of Fire Safety, the following safety measures are required by owners/contractors of multiple dwelling units that utilize light frame construction:
 - A. Cigarette, cigar or other types of smoking within 100' of the worksite shall be prohibited.
 - B. Open burning of any sort including burning for warmth or cooking shall be prohibited.
 - C. A firewatch by a municipal fire marshal shall be required to provide monitoring during period of hot work
 - D. Inspection by a Certified Third-party Inspector of the installation of fire and draft stopping intended to prevent fires from spreading through walls, floors and attics.
 - E. Construction workers doing hot work must have an operable fire extinguisher present within 15' of the work.
 - F. All hot work must be performed under the direct supervision of a licensed tradesperson who must be present onsite at the location of the work being performed.
- 2. A site owner seeking to construct or have constructed multiple dwelling units that utilize light frame construction. must apply for a Fire Safety Permit obtained from the Princeton Buildings Department.
- 3. The application fee for a Fire Safety Permit is on a sliding scale related to size and type and construction:

Below 25 units:\$500

Above 26 and below 100: \$2,500

Above 101 units: \$5,000.

- To receive a permit a property owner must:
 - A. Provide a set of Fire Safety Drawings explaining the fire safety features of the building design including the capacity of the fire suppression system accompanied by a narrative that can be released to the public as to how it will meet the standards of the NJ Division of Fire Safety and the Municipality of Princeton, and including a summary of the Fire Safety Maintenance Plan.
 - B. Post signs prohibiting cigarette, cigar or other types of smoking within 100' of the worksite.
 - C. Post signs prohibiting open burning of any sort including burning for warmth or cooking.
 - D. Request a firewatch by a municipal fire marshal to provide monitoring during periods of hot work.
 - E. Certify that construction workers doing hot work will have an operable fire extinguisher present within 15' of the work and that they have received training in operating the extinguisher.
 - F. Prepare a Fire Safety Maintenance Plan to be posted for public inspection, detailing required maintenance and inspections of fire safety systems, including the fire suppression system, and including inspections for the proper sealing of openings made in the installation of television and other types of cable.
- 5. In granting a fire safety permit, the Municipality of Princeton will require that a fire watch guard and a fire safety

supervisor be present as follows:

- A fire watch guard must be present 24 hours a day to monitor the construction project and alert firefighters, medical, rescue, or law enforcement personnel immediately if a fire or other emergency occurs.
- B. A fire watch-guard shall be present throughout the construction project and shall continue to monitor the multiple dwelling for 48 hours following the issuance of a certificate of occupancy.
- C. A fire watch guard shall make regular inspections of the structure and shall patrol the structure or the areas of the structure assigned to the fire watch guard for supervision by the developer or owner of a multiple dwelling. The developer or owner of a multiple dwelling shall not assign a fire watch guard and any additional responsibilities that would interfere or conflict with the fire watch guard's responsibilities under this section.
- D. A fire watch guard shall maintain a record of activities performed in connection with the construction project that serve as a potential threat to fire safety. The records shall be submitted to the Princeton Buildings Department.
- E. A Fire Safety Supervisor shall be onsite during hours of construction.

5. Definition of a Firewatch Guard

- A. A person who is qualified pursuant to N.J.S.40A:14-9.
- B. A person who has received fire safety training as demonstrated by a fire safety certificate from the NJ

 Division of Fire Safety or from a qualified institution such as Rutgers University, Kean

 University or the
 equivalent.
- C. A developer or owner of a multiple dwelling utilizing fire watch guards to provide 24 hour a day monitoring pursuant to this section, shall be responsible for hiring and compensating qualified fire watch guards. The

pursuant to this section, shall be responsible for hiring and compensating qualified fire watch guards. The Princeton Buildings Department may assess a developer or owner of a multiple dwelling, utilizing a fire watch guard pursuant to this subsection, reasonable administrative fees incurred by the Princeton Building Department in performing its duties as set forth in this subsection.

- D. A developer or owner of a multiple dwelling shall submit to the Princeton Buildings Department, applications for persons being proposed for Fire Watch or Fire –Safety Supervisor containing specific information including: name address, finger prints, and written consent for a criminal history record background check to be performed. The division shall exchange fingerprint data with and receive criminal history record information from the State Bureau of Identification in the Division of State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation consistent with applicable State and Federal laws, rules, and regulations.
- E. Security Guards shall have at a minimum fire safety certificate granted by the NJ Division of Fire Safety, Kean University's Fire Safety Program or equivalent fire safety certification demonstrating training in fire safety.

6. Definition of a Fire Safety Supervisor

- A. Safety Supervisors shall have at a minimum a fire safety certificate granted by the NJ Division of Fire Safety, Kean University's Fire Safety Program or equivalent fire safety certification demonstrating training in fire safety.
- B. The Fire Safety Supervisor shall be responsible for adherence to NJ Division of Fire Safety and Princeton Municipal Fire Safety Standards and Requirements.
- C. The Fire Safety Supervisor shall maintain all records required the NJ Division of Fire Safety and shall maintain copies of all certifications and licensed required for fire safety onsite.

- 7. Responsibilities of the Fire Marshal.
 - A. The fire inspector shall complete a detailed fire inspection checklist.
 - B. The Fire Marshal shall inspect the construction site every 6 months for the year after issuance of the Certificate of Occupancy.
 - The inspection shall include the inspection of attic firewalls to ensure any holes created by installing cable have been properly sealed.
 - 2. A review of all firewalls to ensure that they have been installed correctly.
 - 3. A review of the fire suppression system to ensure that it is in proper working order with the correct Pressure and documentation of required maintenance.
- 8. Definition of an Independent Certified Third-party Inspector
 - A. An Independent Third-party Inspector shall have at a minimum a building inspection certificate and a fire safety certificate granted by the NJ Division of Fire Safety, Kean University's Fire Safety Program or equivalent fire safety certification demonstrating training in fire safety.
 - B. An Independent Certified Third-party Inspector will be responsible for the inspection of fire and draft stopping and must take digital photographs showing the installation of all fire and draft stopping to be available for public inspection.
- 9. Fire extinguishers used onsite at various locations required by law, including locations of hot work, must be selected for the type and size of fire appropriate for each location.

Good Evening,

It is clear that the use of light frame wood construction has brought serious ramifications to communities across the United States. Residents of NJ have experienced the horrendous conflagrations resulting from light frame wood construction that occurred in Edgewater and Maplewood and have seen the devastation of these fires across the nation.

On March 28, 2016, as a result of the Edgewater, NJ conflagration that displaced over 500 residents, I appeared before Mayor and Council requesting the passage of Resolution 16-105 "...to urge for the swift passage of S1632 to provide municipalities with an additional tool 'to reduce the risk of massive fires for the protection of residents, public safety personnel, and property."

Nearly a year later, in February 2017 as the result of yet another light frame wood construction conflagration that occurred in Maplewood, NJ, I stood here asking that you address an immediate public safety issue; namely, the stagnation of S1632/A3700 that sits stalled in committee.

And now 17 months after my first appearance on this issue, sadly, this important legislation which addresses a public safety issue, ~ not only for tenants and homeowners and their personal property but for first responders who bravely give so freely of themselves to protect others ~ remains stalled with no hopes of passing any time in the foreseeable future.

It is clear that one of the major obstacles and the driving force in this stagnation is cost. Building industry lobbyists are working overtime to protect the vested interests of an industry that is putting profit ahead of safety.

S1632 addresses the concern I am here to address this evening: the requirement "...that residential group R-2 structure light frame wood construction projects be monitored by fire watch guards 24 hours a day, seven days a week." It further requires that "a fire watch guard be present from the time construction begins until 48 hours after the issuance of a certificate of occupancy." In addition, "A fire watch guard would also be responsible for ensuring that all construction code requirements are followed with respect to any hot work on the construction site."

There is no need to hire a wordsmith. The language for a 24/7 Fire Watch Ordinance exits. What is needed, however, is an immediate directive to municipal staff to create the document that will demonstrate again that Princeton leads while others follow.

We have listened to Kip and Paul clearly articulate the need for the fire watch ordinance and the urgency of its passage as we move toward the likely development of an additional 40 affordable units at the Princeton Community Village. And on the horizon we await the redevelopment of the Maple Franklin units owned by the Princeton Housing Authority and the likely development of the adjoining parking lot, as well as the proposed senior housing project at the shopping center.

If you choose not to deal with this fire safety measure intended to prevent ignition of an uncontrolled fire, then you give up your right of control over the issue. This matter must not be tabled until next year and be subjected to the lengthy annual 'priority' discussions that take place. At that time there will be two new members on Council who have no or little understanding of this important issue.

You have an opportunity to act now. You need not rely upon and wait for the State legislature to protect the residents of Princeton. It is your responsibility to do what is necessary locally to ensure the greatest protection for our volunteer first responders and the community as a whole.

A year from now you may wish that you had taken action. We have all experienced the failure to have what is necessary in place before a developer comes to town with plans in hand.

The wise counsel I received as a child and young adult evoke fond memories of my mother and father. More importantly their words resound loud and clear this evening; "Don't put off until tomorrow what can be done today."

Comments – Kip Cherry – 8-21-17

I'd like to speak tonight on fire-safety and why this should be a high priority for Princeton Council's consideration right now. I'd like to thank you for your leadership in this area and urge you to do much more. I think there is a notion that the issue is a state issue and not a local one. But it is <u>very local</u>, <u>as all fires are</u>.

- 1. As you know recent multi-family construction here in Princeton, as well as elsewhere has utilized lightweight wood construction, which is very flammable. And when such fires happen it is the <u>local</u> fire department, the <u>local</u> volunteers, who must fight the fire. And I can tell you that there is great concern among fire men and women about these fires and many fire departments will not enter these buildings when they are on fire. I <u>encourage</u> you to reach out to <u>our</u> fire department to learn why.
- There have been numerous conflagrations across the country involving this type of construction, including three terrible fires in New Jersey. These terrible fires have included apartment complexes, condominiums, residence halls and senior living facilities.
- 3. Beyond the threats to the lives of our firemen, these fires are very devastating to those who live in the buildings that burn. So far most of the time residents have gotten out with their lives, although there have been deaths. Uniformly these fires are so very hot and hard to put out that the residents lose everything they own everything, even their pets.
- 4. There are two points when lightweight wood construction can be prone to major fires. One point is at the front-end during construction, which is largely regulated locally. The other is after the building is completed.
- 5. You are correct that completed buildings are subject to the State Building Code. There are several bills pending in the State legislature to amend the State Building Code. One of them is A3770/S1632, which deserves your leadership. Paul has handed out to you a summary of this bill. It is sponsored by legislators representing our district, District 16, as well as others, Assembly members Muoio, Gusciora and Zwicker, and Senators Turner, Bateman and Weinberg, could all use your help and leadership in securing the support of the League of Municipalities and the Conference of Mayors for this bill.
- 6. The other point at which light weight wood construction is subject to terrible fires is during <u>construction</u>. This is where the town and all of you on Council have the most responsibility and opportunity.

- 7. Those of us very concerned about this issue have prepared a <u>detailed</u> enforceable ordinance to cover the construction period which <u>is</u> a <u>local</u> responsibility, NOT a state responsibility. (Prieto's bill for a fire watch, for instance, contains no details and little enforceability I should add that Maplewood had a voluntary firewatch, which did nothing since the place burned down.) The concept behind the ordinance is to give our hardworking fire safety inspectors <u>codified procedures</u> to prevent fires during lightweight wood construction, and to <u>maximize</u> the protection we give to our fire men and women <u>and</u> to our residents whose homes and businesses surround the lightweight wood development. Paul has handed out copies of the draft ordinance which was developed in close consultation with local Princeton professionals it really is a nobrainer and it would make our town safer.
- 8. Let me give you an example of what having an ordinance in place can do. During the construction of a light-weight wood complex here in Princeton, a terrible light weight wood construction fire occurred in Maplewood, up near Newark. We were able to figure out that in all likelihood the fire had been caused by propane heaters used to dry out the drywall. News reports showed large propane tanks feeding these heaters through hoses.
- 9. We noticed similar tanks outside the ongoing project in Princeton. As luck would have it, Council had a meeting coming up and we handed out a picture of these tanks here at a Council meeting. We expressed concern about the safety of these tanks and noted that our proposed ordinance specifically was intended to cover inspection of things such as these tanks. Within a day or two, showing the power of an ordinance, or a proposed ordinance, the tanks were removed. At that time the concern was that we were lucky and that next time we should have a proper ordinance in place. And we still don't, but we should. In my view there is no higher priority than fire safety and protecting our firemen and residents.
- 10. So again, we ask you to proceed with passing this ordinance as a town responsibility, to give your fire safety inspectors unquestionable authority on specific issues, such as inspecting and possibly being required to replace propane hoses. We want to encourage you to get our house in order to prepare for the affordable housing construction effort that lies before us, which almost certainly will be light-weight wood construction. The ordinance is already written in draft form. Now would be a good time to get our fire safety construction ordinance in place so that developers looking at Princeton know what our fire-safety requirements are well in advance. Thank you.

Statement of objection to proposed ordinance 2017-46

We as the Herrontown Lane Association homeowners and as individuals object to the proposed ordinance.

Our attorney, Bruce Afran, is unable to be here tonight due to a family commitment but we are making his statement of our objection to the proposed ordinance.

It is clear to us from the manner in which it has originated and been presented by the Planner to Council that it is intended to enable specific spot zoning for the benefit of one landowner - the owner of the Lanwin tract - and that other potential sites are included in the ordinance solely to give the ordinance some legal cover against a claim of spot zoning.

The ordinance improperly frees the owner of the site of the duty to seek a variance to gain an increase in the number of units for this site. In addition, the calculation that has been presented of 20 one acre plots under existing zoning that is being used to support the ordinance is incorrect as most of the site is unbuildable under existing zoning and DEP regulations and that, at most, 5-9 lots could be constructed as of right under existing rules and laws.

Further, the proposed ordinance by encouraging construction on this site and increasing the number of units available for the Lanwin Tract is inconsistent with the Master Plan that specifically called for this entire site to be placed into preservation, not merely a part of the site.

Further, the owner of the site is illegally purchasing this ordinance by offering in exchange for the approval to give a designated parcel of land to the municipality for affordable housing.

For these reasons and others that our counsel has previously set forth to this Council and stated to the Planning Board, we object to the approval of this ordinance."
