REMARKS OF COUNCILWOMAN HEATHER HOWARD PRINCETON COUNCIL REORGANIZATION MEETING JANUARY 2, 2018

I am pleased to be here today as we embark on a new year, bidding farewell to our colleagues Bernie Miller and Jo Butler and welcoming David Cohen and Leticia Fraga to the Council.

So much has already been said so eloquently about our successes and challenges, so I will be brief and note that we certainly have our work cut out for us this year.

I hope we will continue to be a bulwark against regressive actions from Washington, D.C. — whether it is tax legislation that targets communities like ours, abandonment of efforts to address climate change, or attempts to shred the safety net.

That means standing up for our values – including being a welcoming community and supporting a police department that exemplifies our conviction that law enforcement should be guardians of the public, not warriors, the standard set by President Obama's Task Force on 21st Century Policing. Assistant Administrator and Health Officer Jeff Grosser has shepherded the health department through the accreditation process this year, a process that has helped strengthen our efforts to promote a healthy community. Elisa Neira, our director of our human services, works tirelessly and with poise and good humor to help the most vulnerable in our community. And Chief of Police Nick Sutter leads a department that is recognized statewide for its focus on strengthening ties to the community, making us all safer. They embody the best of Princeton.

Looking ahead to 2018, I'm honored to be serving on the Princeton Council and look forward to working with my colleagues and so many engaged citizens to ensure a vibrant, welcoming and sustainable Princeton.
